

PARTA VIRTUAL MEETING MINUTES

The February PARTA Meeting was called to order by President Dixie Wheeler followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Jeannie Blane introduced the program guest, Pam Winterroth, a harpist, who provided the membership with several musical renditions. The program was followed by questions and answers. Pam Winterroth's programs can be viewed at "Harp Serenity" on Facebook and YouTube.

- Treasurer: Jeff Vallosio reported that a summary of the treasurer's report was printed in the Soundings. Jeff will send a file to any member requesting the treasurer's report or budget report. The budget report will be approved at the March meeting.
- Member Benefits Committee: Pat Hampton serves as the chair of the IRTA Member Benefits Committee. The committee is a state committee, with six (6) members. one member from each area. The committee meets in September and January.

Pat provided information on the Dental Plan which was up for review this year. The committee met with the AMBA representative, Gary DeVito. An aggressive Dental Plan was negotiated and approved. The Dental Plan was approved to include dental implants. It should be noted this is a Dental Plan upgrade. The plan covers 80% in-network and 70% out of network.

Another Dental Plan was also approved but the benefits are not as good.

There was no change in the Vision Plan. The Dental Health Experts* Members were encouraged to contact the AMBA representative to discuss any concerns regarding the **Dental and Vision Plans.**

• Foundation Scholarships: Valda Shipp reported on the IRTA Foundation Scholarships and the Excellence in **Education Grants. She informed the membership that**

- Membership: John Rathbun reported that membership starts at the beginning of the year. Most of the members have Life Membership. The fee for Life Membership is \$120. Life Membership keeps members connected to the organization, even though they are not physically present at meetings.
- Legislative Update Dixie Wheeler There was no Legislative report. House Speaker Welch has suspended meetings.

AGENDA ITEMS

Establishing a Membership Committee

 President Wheeler voiced a desire to establish a Membership Committee to assist in maintaining the growth and



sustainability of PARTA. She was concerned that prospective members were falling by the wayside, due to the lack of an established recruiting plan. In the next month or so, she would like a few interested people to organize and create a system for member recruitment. Roger Hampton, Pat Hampton, and Sally Weber volunteered to serve on the committee.

 Unit of Distinction Program - Information on the IRTA Unit of Distinction Program was provided by President Wheeler. It is a voluntary program, based on the honor system, designed to help guide and direct local unit leaders in the management of their unit. Units can receive \$250, if various membership criteria are met. President Wheeler acknowledged that PARTA has met some of the qualifying criteria, but improvement is needed in the area requiring the establishment of an active Membership Committee.

The Unit of Distinction Program is non-competitive. A motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Pat Hampton and seconded by Deloris Turner.



TEACHERS RETIREMENT SYSTEM (TRS) UPDATED



TRS closed out a challenging 2020, dominated by the

economic upheaval of the COVID-19 pandemic, with a positive 7.9 percent investment return and a \$57.2 billion portfolio – the largest balance in the System's 82-year history.

Even with the effects of the coronavirus pandemic, the TRS long-term investment returns continued to exceed the System's long-term assumed investment return of 7 percent. The 40-year return for TRS at the end of calendar year 2020 was 9.3 percent.

UNUSUAL INCREASE IN MEMBER RETIREMENTS

Interestingly, this jump did not occur during the system's normal "retirement season" between January and June. The jump began in July, before the beginning of the new school year, and continued through October. **Traditionally during** July to October. retirement numbers decline.

Between June and September, teacher retirements jumped by 45 percent compared to the similar timeframe in 2019. In July of 2020, retirements increased by 38 percent over the two prior years and jumped by 67 percent in August 2020 compared to 2019 and 2018.

Anecdotally, members retiring in July through October mentioned to TRS counselors that their retirements were related to the drastic changes in teaching caused by COVID-19. During July and August of 2020 school officials in Illinois were making crucial decisions about distance learning, hybrid schedules and how the 2020-2021 school year would begin for students, teachers, staff and parents.

NEW OPTIONAL DEFINED CONTRIBUTION PLAN

TRS is close to introducing its first-ever "defined contribution" offering – the TRS Supplemental Savings Plan, or "SSP." The SSP will be "an optional benefit to any member who chooses to participate" if the member is active in Tier 1 or Tier 2.

Retired and inactive TRS members will not be eligible for the SSP.

As a Defined Contribution (DC) plan, the SSP will supplement the existing TRS defined benefit (DB) pension plan. The SSP does not replace the DB plan for participating members. TRS members cannot opt out of the DB plan and place their DB contributions into the new SSP.

Members participating in the SSP will still make payroll contributions to their DB pension.

2020 ILLINOIS RETIRED TEACHERS FOUNDATION GRANT WINNERS

This winter, the Illinois Retired Teachers' Foundation (IRTF) awarded \$36,489 in grant money to public-school educators from across the state. 65 projects were selected from 247 submitted proposals. 
A dazzling novel about all the choices that go into a life well lived. Between life and death

ILLINOIS DRIVER'S LICENSE AND ID CARD RENEWAL

Secretary of State, Jesse White, has extended the expiration dates for driver's licenses and ID cards to June 1, 2021, so that those who have to visit an office may wait for warmer weather. The offices are marked off for social distancing so there is not the usual amount of waiting space inside buildings, and lines may get long outside.

The deadline for getting a REAL ID to use for domestic travel purposes was extended to October 1, 2021. With conditions still in a state of flux because of the virus, it is best to check online for the most up-to-date information at: www.cyberdriveillinois.com/

SOCIAL SECURITY IMPOSTOR COMPLAINTS SHATTER RECORD IN 2020

ILLINOIS

Crooks posing as Social Security employees triggered a record-shattering number of 718,000 complaints in 2020 and led to nearly \$45 million in victim losses, proving pandemic shutdowns did not thwart what the Social Security commissioner called a "terrible" problem. The average victim lost \$6,100 in calendar year 2020. TIPS from AARP:

- Genuine SSA employees will never promise to increase your benefits or resolve an identity theft issue if you pay a fee or move your money into a "protected" account.
- If you owe money to Social Security, the agency will mail you a letter with your payment options and appeal rights. SSA does not suspend Social Security numbers or demand secrecy from you in order to resolve a problem.
