May 21, 2018

Abby Humbles welcomed everyone and called the meeting to order.

New Business:

- Dates for future board meetings at 10:15 at Lakeview Library: August 27 and November 12.
- Kathy will be gone for the June meeting and Frances Farraher agreed to take minutes in her place.
- Roger Hampton suggested PARTA have matching officers with IRTA, such as the Legislative committee or Information Services. Roger will make a list of possible matching offices.
- Members of the Morton Civic Chorus will be performing at the PARTA June meeting. They perform annually to benefit the Central Illinois Memorial Kidney Fund.
- Ann Winget moved to donate a \$100 check to the Central Illinois Memorial Kidney Fund and to the Peoria Humane Society from the program budget. Frances Farraher seconded it. The motion carried. PARTA will be donating to nonprofit speakers.




Before We Were Yours

INFORMATION AT THE TIME OF PUBLICATION:

SB 3046: This legislation would allow any eligible TRS benefit recipients or TRS dependent beneficiaries to re-enroll into TRIP if they had previously opted not to participate in the program.

On May 25th, Representative Gordon-Booth passed IRTA's Legislation, the bill out of the House Chamber 91-11-2, and it is now back in the Senate for Concurrence.

HB 3080: This legislation increases the amount of employment as a teacher that a retired teacher may

perform without impairing retirement status and allows 120 paid days or 600 paid hours in a school year, but not more than 100 paid days in the same classroom.

This legislative session ends May 31.
