FEBRUARY 6, 2023



The February PARTA meeting was held at the Cater Inn on February 6, 2023. Vice-President, Valda Shipp presided for President Dixie Wheeler. Sixty-nine members were in attendance. There were no new members. Vice-President, Shipp thanked Ann Christophel for greeting the members. Dave Barnwell led the Pledge and Invocation. Jeannie Blane introduced the guest speaker, Beth Crider, Regional Superintendent of Schools. Beth highlighted the State of the Region. She shared the following points:

- The Peoria Stadium is currently being demolished.
- It has been documented that due to COVID, students' learning loss has decreased by 30%.
- Efforts through high-quality after-school programs, tutoring and Social and Emotional Learning initiatives across the county have been instituted.
- Many safety updates are occurring.
- Illinois has a 79% teacher shortage and a prevalent issue with obtaining substitute teachers.

BUSINESS MEETING

The Treasurer's report is on the table. Members were asked to visit the table with donated books. There is also a suggestion box on the back table for ideas on upcoming programs.

PARTA has been designated a Unit of Merit by the IRTA. A monetary award of \$250 is given to Units meeting organizational, community, and programming criteria.

Sally Weber reminded members of the information on the table for anyone interested in becoming a literacy tutor through the ROE.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

ALTRUISTIC Denise Smith: Denise still encourages members to contact her if they know any deceased members. She will submit names to the Soundings.

PROGRAMS Jeannie Blane: The Program Committee would like members to place program ideas in the Suggestion Box.

MEMBERSHIP Dues - Jeff Vallosio: PARTA and IRTA dues are collected at the designated back table. All PARTA members are highly encouraged to join IRTA.

AUDIT Dave Barnwell: The Audit Committee will meet after the luncheon.

IRTA Informational Updates - Roger Hampton: IRTA is still working for its members. Roger highlighted a few ways the organization is working for its members:

- The lawsuit, IRTA vs. the State of Illinois, is still ongoing. Working on an agreement concerning funding is still an issue.
- Pat Hampton serves as Chair of the Benefits Committee. Her committee has assisted IRTA members in navigating through benefits.
- There will be proposed Constitution changes at the IRTA Convention this Fall.
- IRTA offers free Informational webinars each month. You will need to sign-up to attend.
- Coffee with the Executive Director, Jim Bachman, is scheduled each month. Members have an opportunity to pose any questions or concerns.

Vice-President Shipp asked for a motion to adjourn the meeting. Denise Smith moved to adjourn the meeting. Peggy Shane seconded the motion.

ILLINOIS 103RD GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Notable changes in rules for the 103rd **General Assembly include the** elimination of remote floor voting (virtual committee testimony will still be allowed) and the Rules committee is no longer required to refer every bill to a committee.

1.307 bills have been filed in the Senate and 2,132 bills have been filed in the House (as of February 4th).

Both chambers have set their committees and appointed members, allowing committee work to begin.

2023 KEY REMAINING SESSION DEADLINES

March 10: Deadline - Senate Bills Out of Senate Committee & House Bills out of House Committee

March 24: Deadline – Third Reading House Bills in the House

March 31: Deadline – Third Reading Senate Bills in the Senate April 4: Consolidated Election

April 28: Deadline – House Bills out of Senate Committee & Senate Bills out of House Committee

May 11: Deadline - Third Reading House Bills in Senate

May 12: Deadline – Third Reading Senate Bills in House

May 19: Adjournment

Illinois' public health emergency will end on May 11, 2023, aligning the state with the federal government's decision to end the national public health emergency.



People don't always connect their vision changes to their medications, but medications are a common cause of vision changes. Below is a list of just a few medications that can lead to vision changes, problems, and/or double vision:



- ✓ Alendronate (Fosamax)
- ✓ Topiramate (Topamax)
- ✓ Isotretinoin (Accutane)
- Amiodarone (Cordarone)
- ✓ Tamsulosin (Flomax)
- ✓ Sildenafil (Viagra)
- Tamoxifen
- Chlorpromazine (Thorazine)
- ✓ Ethambutol (Myambutol / EMB)
- Hydroxychloroquine (Plaquenil)
- Diphenhydramine (Benadryl)
- Cidofovir (Vistide)
- Prednisone
- Digoxin (Lanoxin)
- ✓ Fingolimod (Gilenya)
- Rifampin (Rifadin)
- Doxycycline (Vibramycin)



FACTS ABOUT BLOOD SUPPLY NEEDS





- Every 2 seconds someone in the U.S. needs blood and or platelets.
- Approximately 29,000 units of red blood cells are needed every day in the U.S.
- Nearly 5,000 units of platelets and 6,500 units of plasma are needed daily in the U.S.
- Nearly 16 million blood components are transfused each year in the U.S.
- Sickle cell disease affects 90,000 to 100,000 people in the U.S. About 1,000 babies are born with the disease each year. Sickle cell patients can require blood transfusions throughout their lives.
- The average red blood cell transfusion is approximately 3 units.
- A single car accident victim can require as many as 100 units of blood.
- The blood type most often requested by hospitals is type O.
- One donation can help save more than one life.
- According to the American Cancer Society, more than 1.8 million people were diagnosed with cancer in 2020. Many of them will need blood, sometimes daily, during their chemotherapy treatment. Source: https://www.redcrossblood.org/
