CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHTS



HEALTH INSURANCE BENEFITS ARE PROTECTED

Kanerva v. Weems:

• This was a constitutional challenge to an amendment to the State Employees Group Insurance Act which reduced State contributions toward health insurance costs for retired public pension system members and their survivors.

• The Court held that this amendment was unconstitutional.

• The Pension Protection Clause protects more than the pension annuity. It protects all "benefits" of membership in a pension system, including health insurance benefits.

• If there is any doubt about the scope of a constitutional protection for pension rights, those doubts are resolved in favor of the pensioner.

TEACHERS' RETIREMENT INSURANCE PROGRAM (TRIP) REMINDER

For Medicare-eligible members, the 2019 TRAIL Medicare Advantage Prescription Drug (MAPD) Open Enrollment period ENDS November 15, 2018.



Retirement Insurance Program (TRIP) SB 3046 was signed into law amending legislation to allow former TRIP members and dependents who previously opted-out of their health benefits plan, to be allowed to opt-back-in



during an open enrollment period or other qualifying enrollment periods.

You do not have to do anything if you do not want to make changes to your current TRAIL plan, or if you do not want to opt back into TRIP.

It's popular come election time for Republicans and Democrats, when political circumstances suit them, to clamor for the state's top lawyer to investigate corruption, almost always to no avail.

What one party may hail as a righteous quest for justice, the other likely will condemn as a politically tainted abuse of power. Yet candidates often cannot resist taking up the cudgel of anti-corruption, sometimes identifying their targets by name. In Illinois and elsewhere, however, there's often a chasm between political rhetoric and legal reality, with candidates for high office eager to fashion themselves as the reincarnation of Eliot Ness.
